Safeguarding

Led by Rachel Adams, Safeguarding Lead and Deputy Head from TWAPA, the purpose is to check we are all of course up to scratch and keeping children in our care safe but also to share best practice and learn from one another. Rachel says 'Our annual monitoring tool has been put in place to ensure that Safeguarding across all academies in the Trust is not only effective, but also best practice. To quote the HMI who recently conducted an Ofsted Inspection in one of our academies, a 'belt and braces'

approach to safeguarding should be non-negotiable.'

This is the fifth time reviews have taken place but the first time that they have been peer-led. This has been an interesting professional opportunity for colleagues to visit other academies in the Trust and learn from each other to create consistent systems and processes.

And of course, safeguarding training (and learning) never stops. It is really important that everybody continues to engage with the quizzes and updates throughout the year. Keep watching that inbox for the next set of questions.

Thank you to all those academies that have taken part so far, everyone has been hospitable, welcoming and happy to share ideas and resources. The feedback is very positive and will help us further develop safeguarding across IEMAT'.
